Musical Instruments

Have you ever stopped to ponder why some instruments are more popular than others? Why do some styles of music get played on particular instruments and not others? This is a fascinating topic to delve into, and I don't by any means claim to know all the answers. Hopefully we might get some members writing in to the editor to contribute to this topic...

George Bolliger

Piano:

I was recently trying to verify a comment that someone had made to me that Australia at one stage had more pianos per head of population than any other country. I wasn't able to prove this, but did find out some interesting trivia.

Australia currently has about one million pianos. At present there are about 250 qualified piano tuners, of which 95% are male and at least 65% are over 50 years old. This will create a problem at some point, if no-one decides to continue with this profession.

The first piano travelled by ship (the Sirius) to Australia in 1788. In 1834 the first locally made piano was produced by John Benham. Pianos were most popular as an instrument in the late 1800's up until around 1930. Around the start of WW1 importation of German pianos was stopped – I wonder why?

There were a number of local manufacturers (Beale is probably the most famous of these), but apparently most of them got bought out by piano importers. W. H. Paling and Co. and others sought to reduce their local competition by buying up and closing down the local piano industry; they could make more profit from imported instruments. (This appears to be all too familiar in the Australian manufacturing industry.)

There are many stories of how pianos would be transported by horse and cart from a farm house to the local hall and back again after the dance was over. Obviously the tuning would be affected by this rough treatment, but the dancers were generally oblivious to this and just happy to have music to dance to.

In time, many communities were able to afford to install a piano in the local hall. The Steinway piano at the Prince of Wales Opera House in Gulgong is perhaps the best example.

With the advent of electronic keyboards, that are vastly more portable and convenient to tune/play, the death rattle appears to have been sounded for many old pianos. The cost of restoring and maintaining them is considered no longer viable in many instances. It is interesting that in many community halls the unrestored piano still remains in place, but the community has not thought to install a replacement keyboard.....

Bush Music Club's Young Musicians go to the National

After two years of anticipation and then disappointment, the National Folk Festival finally emerged from the enforced hibernation that was Covid.

Youth Bush Band

For the BMC Saplings this festival was an important step forward with the Youth Bush Band coming together and playing for their first bush dance as a group. This was a great opportunity for the young players to take their music to the next level - the group was actually accepted on the 2020 NFF programme but had to cool their heels for two years before they got their chance!

With members that were scattered across NSW, it was difficult for the group to get together on a regular basis but Zoom meetings and a couple of practices together in Canberra meant that the sound was nice and tight.

Saplings Sessions

The Saplings were scheduled for one hour sessions on the Sat, Sun and Monday of the festival in the outdoor "Session tent". This turned out to be a much better venue than in previous years since it allowed us more space to work in with our break-out groups each day.

We had between 20 - 30 participants each day and the sessions would typically start with the whole group together singing a song to get everyone involved. Smaller groups were then made up depending on the instruments and the proficiency level of the players. This gave the young musicians the opportunity to play at their own pace, hone their playing abilities and learn some new tunes along the way. The groups would then all come back together to play through what they had learnt and the session finished with another song.

Unfortunately, we were not allocated a concert spot on the last day as we had been in previous years but the BMC concert party gave them half an hour at the start of their Monday session so that they could perform the songs and tunes they had been learning over the weekend - a BIG thank you to the Concert Party!!

It's exciting to see how the Saplings have progressed over the years and to have some of the original members now becoming tutors. Thank you to all the tutors and to the parents who bring their kids to our sessions.

The survival of bush music is in good hands.
